
UK Government and Parliament

Focus on our new website Feedback Centre

What we've been hearing

Healthwatch York is your way to influence local health and social care services – hospitals, GP surgeries, home care services and many others. Here are some key issues we are hearing about in York:

Mixed experience at hospital

We heard from a person who had been seen by the audiology team at the hospital a number of times. Most recently they went and had a thorough review, the consultant was charming and all the staff were lovely. However, no follow up appointment was arranged and they felt they needed this. They tried to get in touch 10 days later, but couldn't get through. They have found it is really difficult to get in touch by phone or any other way.

Confusion over appointment

We received feedback from a person who has two broken teeth and an abscess which cause constant pain, The only emergency dentist with availability is in Leeds and they don't have transport or the money to get there. They live on painkillers as they can't get any other help.

there is no evidence it causes autism in children

The government Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency has confirmed on the government website GOV.UK, that there is no evidence that taking paracetamol during pregnancy causes autism in children.

Dr Alison Cave, the Chief Safety Officer made the following statement:

"Patient safety is our top priority. There is no evidence that taking paracetamol during pregnancy causes autism in children.

"Paracetamol remains the recommended pain relief option for pregnant women when used as directed. Pregnant women should continue to follow existing NHS guidance and speak to their healthcare professional if they have questions about any medication during pregnancy. Untreated pain and fever can pose risks to the unborn baby, so it is important to manage these symptoms with the recommended treatment.

"Our advice on medicines in pregnancy is based on rigorous assessment of the best available scientific evidence. Any new evidence that could affect our recommendations would be carefully evaluated by our independent scientific experts.

"We continuously monitor the safety of all medicines, including those used during pregnancy, through robust monitoring and surveillance. We encourage anyone to report any suspected side effects to us via the Yellow Card scheme."

Full medical guidance about taking paracetamol whilst pregnant and breastfeeding can be found on the NHS website.

The advice makes it clear that:

"Paracetamol is the first choice of painkiller if you're pregnant. It's commonly taken during pregnancy and does not harm your baby.

"You can take normal doses of paracetamol if you're breastfeeding.

Paracetamol is a first-choice painkiller during breastfeeding. It passes into breast milk in very small amounts. The amount of paracetamol your baby gets is far less than what they would get from a dose of paracetamol given to them directly.

Martha's Rule rolled out to all acute hospitals

NHS England has announced that Martha's Rule is being expanded to every acute hospital in England, as new data shows hundreds of patients have benefitted from potentially life-saving changes to their care thanks to the scheme.

Martha's Rule is a major patient safety initiative in hospitals encouraging patients, families and carers to speak to the care team if they notice changes in someone's condition.

It also provides them with a way to seek an urgent review if their or their loved one's condition deteriorates – and they are concerned this is not being responded to.


Staff can themselves ask for a review from a different team if they are concerned the appropriate action is not being taken.

Between September 2024 and June 2025, there were 4,906 calls made to Martha's Rule helplines to escalate concerns about care – leading to 241 potentially life-saving interventions being triggered.

The positive results from the first year have led the NHS to expand its use to an additional 67 sites – meaning all 210 acute inpatient sites in England will offer the service.

What are people saying about prevention and early intervention?

prevent ill health are not missed? Healthwatch England have published a blog which examines why prevention matters and the barriers that exist.

Health leaders often discuss the importance of prevention and early intervention services in helping people avoid ill health or death or identify problems early to prevent them from worsening.

These services not only benefit patients, they can also reduce the demand for care on an NHS that is already under pressure.

The NHS Ten Year Plan sets out an ambitious agenda for healthcare in England, with prevention of ill health and early intervention as central pillars. The plan includes aims to reduce smoking and problem drinking, tackle obesity, improve children's mental health, access to vaccines, and screening opportunities.

People tell us how prevention can be life-changing. Done right, it can help people avoid complications, stay out of the hospital, and get support when it's needed most. But positive experiences are not universal.

Healthwatch England have analysed stories people have shared that indicate that there are four key barriers to accessing prevention and early intervention services: poor information and promotion, inaccessible services, inflexible services, and missed opportunities for earlier intervention.

York Hospital joins coordinated national effort to trial cancer vaccine

Patients at York Hospital being treated for advanced head and neck cancer will be able to access a trial for a potential ground breaking cancer vaccine.

York and Scarborough Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust has been selected as part of a national expansion by the NHS Cancer Vaccine Launch Pad (CVLP),

The CVLP was launched by NHS England and is coordinated by the Southampton Clinical Trials Unit, based at the University of Southampton.

This latest trial to be included in the CVLP programme is an investigational cancer vaccine, clinically known as AHEAD-MERIT (BNT113-01). It's a pioneering mRNA vaccine designed by multinational company BioNTech.

It is the latest cancer vaccine trial to use cutting-edge microbiology. The vaccine is designed to help the immune system recognise and kill cancer cells which express human papillomavirus (HPV) proteins.

Have you been an inpatient in York or Scarborough Hospital recently?



York and Scarborough Teaching Hospitals are reviewing the questions used in their "Mealtimes Matter" survey. This survey is used by staff twice a year to observe mealtimes on wards across the Trust's hospitals. Results from the survey help to identify things that are working well and areas that could be improved.

The Trust wants to make sure the questions in the survey reflect what matters most to patients at mealtimes, as well as covering what the NHS and Care Quality Commission say a good mealtime looks like. To help the Trust review the survey questions, we are running a patient engagement event to hear from people about their recent hospital mealtime experiences – what works well, what doesn't and what could be improved. Information from participants will be used to shape the questions in the next "Mealtimes Matter" survey.

The event will take place on Friday 10 October from 10am until 12pm at the Priory Street Centre in York (15 Priory Street, York YO1 6ET), in partnership with Healthwatch York. Complementary refreshments (a selection of tea, coffee, and herbal teas with biscuits) will be provided on arrival.

Toddlers to get free flu nasal spray in pharmacies for the first time

Community Pharmacy England has announced that toddlers are now able to get a free flu nasal spray from certain pharmacies. You can book an appointment through the NHS website, where you will also find details of which pharmacies are offering the nasal spray locally

Janet Morrison, Chief Executive of Community Pharmacy England, said:

"Community pharmacies are pleased to now be able to offer NHS flu vaccination to 2- and 3-year-olds, as well as adults. With a network of pharmacies in key locations where people live, work and shop, this new service should make it easier for parents to get their children protected. Increasing vaccination rates will help keep flu at bay in our communities this winter".

Start Safe, Stay Safe - New app to improve street safety in York and North Yorkshire

A new app, Start Safe, Stay Safe, has been launched to improve street safety in York and North Yorkshire. It offers a straightforward, and confidential way for members of the public to report street, town and city centre incidents. It also enables authorities to quickly identify patterns of abuse and criminal behaviour and help them to respond more effectively.

The app developed by Stop Hate UK was funded by the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority and supported by City of York Council, North Yorkshire Council, North Yorkshire Police and Leaders Unlocked.

The app is free to download and available 24-hours a day to people affected by street harassment in public places to report their experiences and get independent support and advice.

It will enable users to:

- Report anonymously for information only
- · Access specialist support
- Capture audio, video and picture evidence
- Report the incident for formal investigation by police or council
- It also provides a route through to Stop Hate UK 24/7 helpline providing further guidance on support and reporting.
